Nobis et Scholae

Since last I wrote, the School has been settling into the new routine of a five-day teaching week. We have also welcomed our first weekly boarders. I am delighted to say that both initiatives have been very well received by parents and pupils and have contributed to a very obvious increase in the level of demand for places at the School.

Given that we are in the depths of a period of sustained economic difficulty, this is remarkable and is a tribute to all those who have worked hard to raise standards and increase the range of opportunities available to our pupils. Perhaps more than anything, it is a reflection of the superb impression that our boys and girls create when they meet and talk to others. Certainly, those Club members who met the Senior Monitors and Monitors at October's Annual Dinner were full of praise for their obvious intelligence, sense of engagement and pride in being members of such a great School.

On the academic front, last year was another one in which records were broken. We had excellent A level results, with 42% of papers being graded A* or A, well over 15% at A* and more than a quarter of the year group obtaining three or more A* or A grades. As a result, the vast majority of our leavers have moved on to top universities, and six former pupils took up places at Oxford and Cambridge this term. The highest performing A level candidate was Christos Charalambous who achieved 5 A* grades and is now studying Economics at UCL. Meanwhile, our AS level results were the best

on record with over 60% of papers being awarded grades A or B. We also had our best year ever at GCSE, for the second year running, despite the first fall in national pass rates for 24 years. More than 60% of our GCSE entries were graded A* or A and well over half of the year group were awarded at least six A* or A grades. I am tremendously proud of the achievements of all our public examination candidates, and I hope that they are equally proud of themselves.

Despite the continuing trend of increasingly strong academic performance, our extra-curricular achievements remain as impressive as ever. So far this term, we have seen some excellent performances and results on the rugby and hockey fields and an array of triumphs in our minor sports. The School's musical life grows ever richer, ranging from the sublime performances of the Chapel Choir to the mass participation in October's house music competition. Drama and Art also continue to flourish. I would like to take this opportunity to warmly invite members of the Club to attend next term's major production, *Our Country's Good*. The School enjoys the success it does for many reasons. One of them is the support afforded us by the Club. Christopher Maunder Taylor, last year's President, has proved to be a staunch and generous advocate for the work that we do, as has his successor, Andy Mortimer. It was particularly good to see them and other guests at the official opening of the Old Millhillians' Room in September. The room has been refurbished and hung with portraits of some of our most distinguished alumni and it is extremely humbling to see how many former pupils have gone on to eminence in a huge variety of fields. Our job now is to make sure that their ranks are swelled by boys and girls who are currently at the School and others who will come to us in future years. Given the quality of the pupils we have today, I have no doubt that the walls of the Old Millhillians' Room will become ever more crowded with images of those who have gone on to make their mark upon the world.

The New President: Andy Mortimer

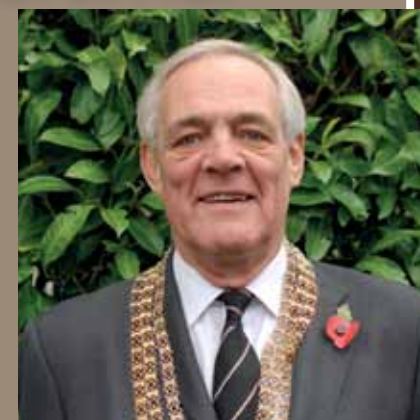
Our President for 2012/13, Andy Mortimer, was in Burton Bank. Academically unremarkable or, at best, idle, he spent most of his time in one sporting arena or another with rugby to the fore though he has fond memories of being deployed as something of a heavyweight lout for the hockey XI.

He played for OMRFC from 1961-66, skipping in the last couple of years before decamping to WASPS where he was Vice-Captain, until serious injury abruptly ended his playing career in 1968. After that and by now married to Georgina, work commitments took them first to Birmingham and then, unexpectedly, to Australia in 1974 - and with three very small children. Whilst there, he rather unwisely took on a bet late one evening that he could play a 3rd XV game for one of the better known local clubs. Over 30 and not at his fittest, he won the bet and was delighted, not to say flattered, to be spotted by the 1st XV coach as a good prospect! The old injury re-emerged just in time to prevent any further adventures on that front.

The family returned to the UK in late 1982 and it was not long before Andy was once again involved in OMRFC. He was Chairman for 14 years and derived a lot of pleasure from watching some very good OM XVs in that time. He was also on the Middlesex Committee for 24 years, 3 of them as President between 2005 and 2008. He managed the county's playing sides for 12 years and led them on 4 overseas

tours to Argentina, Spain, Italy and Canada.

Two of his children, Sophie and Max, attended Mill Hill in the Sixth Form and thoroughly enjoyed the experience.



Andy has been Chairman of Club Lands, the freeholder of Headstone Lane, for a number of years and Chairman of the OMC for the last 4 years, a position he will temporarily relinquish during his year of Presidency. Despite all this OM involvement, it is thought that he did work in the past, though nobody is sure at what and he has retired from all that anyway. His main alternative interest is as Treasurer of the George Adamson Wildlife Trust, a charity which supports the work of another OM, Tony Fitzjohn, in Tanzania.

Climbing Mount Kilimanjaro

Last September I and 25 others from Birmingham University trekked up Mt. Kilimanjaro, the world's tallest freestanding mountain. In the process I managed to raise £2,918 for the Practical Action, a charity which has helped over a million people in the Third World. £75,000 was raised by our group as a whole, through fundraising events and sponsorship, including a very generous grant for equipment from the Old Millhillians Club.

The trek up Kilimanjaro itself was far harder than I had ever imagined, four of the most challenging yet rewarding days of my life. As the air got thinner everyone started to suffer from Acute Mountain Sickness (AMS) with its crippling headaches and nausea. For me, the personal highlight was reaching the top of the Baranco Wall on the third day, after scrambling up an almost vertical cliff face – the most technical part of the climb. Kilimanjaro's has an extraordinary variety of stunning scenery, from rainforest to shrub land to alpine desert and finally to arctic conditions at the summit.

The final summit attempt was made from the base camp but my recollections were somewhat hazy because of the effects of altitude. We started at midnight and trekked for seven hours through the darkness; something of a blur, like the morning after a boozy night out – seven hours of walking, stumbling and crawling up scree slopes

Last year I applied to the OMs for a donation to climb to Everest Base Camp in aid of Sparks Children's Charity, and after being put in touch with Nigel Baker I was given £200 sponsorship!

Well, I am happy to report back that I made it successfully to Base Camp and raised over £4,660!

The climb was definitely the hardest thing I have ever done in my life, and it was tough both physically and mentally, but I am so unbelievably happy that I did it, and with your help!

Over the holidays I got the chance to work with an OM in finance. That OM was one Jonathan Zenios, and I was interning at his recently set-up hedge fund. One of the first memories I had at ZIPartners was turning up there, looking up to the sky and staring at this building that shone bright in the sunlight, and thinking to myself "this could be good".

My main task at the hedge fund was to set-up a linear optimiser for a portfolio of shares. To the non-technical person, that's just a computer program that determines the best returning stocks on the market and tells you how much to invest in them. This was quite an important job, given that the optimiser could be used to direct the investments of hundreds of millions of euros at any moment in time.

Though I didn't quite get the optimiser finished during my 8 weeks there, I was told I'd made a great contribution to the project and gained insights into the ever-changing worlds of both computing and finance. The good humour of Jim, Chris, Eloise and my other colleagues helped us get through the long hours of the day. I think the highlight of the internship was probably being called "the best thing to come out of Mill Hill, after me" by Jonathan at a business dinner, where the team were treated to some good food and wine.

I owe a debt of gratitude to Shalaka at the OM club office and to Jonathan Zenios. Without her putting me in touch with the right people, I wouldn't have had such a great opportunity this summer. And to any young Millhillians reading this, it might be an idea to get in touch with her if you'd like work experience. It could work out as well for you as it did for me.

After a difficult trek down we then made the most of our time in East Africa by going on Safari in the Serengeti, visiting the capital of Tanzania, Dar el Salem, and relaxing on the beaches of the beautiful spice island of Zanzibar. The experience had challenged me in every way possible – far beyond anything I thought I could do. Once again I cannot thank enough everyone who made this trip possible, especially those who sponsored me, the OMC included.

Letters from around the world

Three Weeks in Stratford or Memoirs of an OM Second String

The first OMs to pick up on my connection with the Paralympics were Jim Roberts and Mike Henderson. They twigged that my wife, Eva Loeffler, was the daughter of the late Sir Ludwig Guttman (widely recognised as the Founder of the Paralympics) and that this genetic link plus her involvement in promoting sport for the disabled in the 30 years since my father-in-law's death had led to her very exciting and exacting appointment to the post of Mayor of the Paralympic Village. Mike Henderson and Tim Corbett then came up with the idea that I should tell my side of the story in *Martlet*. I am only too pleased to do so, having previously been completely ignored by the national and international media who pounced upon Eva once her mayoral role was made public and almost drowned her in requests for radio, TV and press interviews. The rush was also fuelled by the timely screening of 'The Best of Men' a BBC biopic starring the splendid Eddie Marsan and Rob Brydon. It told the story of Ludwig Guttman's 1940s Stoke Mandeville struggle to convince doctors, nurses, administrators and the patients themselves that paraplegics, rather than dying within months, could have a normal life span and enjoy the dignity of proper places in society and in the sporting world.

So we moved into our commodious Paralympic Village apartment (one of 2800) for a three-week stay on 21st September, 8 days ahead of the start of the 2012 Paralympics because the Mayor is the focus not only of the Village but also of 'team welcoming ceremonies'. These were held in the Village Plaza. They lasted around 45 minutes and were staged about six times a day, 5 or 6 countries out of the 164 attending the Paralympics being involved at a time. These ceremonies consisted of

spirited performances by colourfully clad and face-painted members of the National Youth Theatre who declaimed, danced, did gymnastics and pranced around on bicycles and spring-loaded metal stilts to music by 'Queen' (Bicycle Race and We are the Champions). At about mid-point Eva would give her welcome speech and exchange gifts with chosen dignitaries from each country present. Appropriate national anthems would be played, national flags would be raised with military precision. I watched about a dozen of these ceremonies because I found them moving and because it gave me a chance to meet up with Eva from time to time!

Other daytime activities for Eva (but not her side kick) were arranged by her four personal assistants and included media interviews, welcoming dignitaries, visiting the Village, pressing much flesh and contributing to the torrent of bonhomie and goodwill generated by the hordes of volunteers. Then there were 'workforce lunches'. Volunteers involved in various duties would ballot for a place at the Mayor's table – I had a free pass! The company at these lunches was eclectic. I once found myself sitting between a Roman Catholic priest and a cleaner from Scarborough Hospital who was on unpaid leave! These lunches were held in the Main Dining Hall, a vast temporary structure which was big enough to house 800 London buses and catered for every cuisine imaginable. You would collect your tray, your cutlery and sally forth.

Tours around the Paralympic Village, its buildings, its clinic, its future school, its gym, its pub (no alcohol at present), its gardens and its squares could take hours because volunteers, athletes, their coaches and



their carers all wanted to be photographed with Eva. Almost no one was interested in a picture of me – and I had even invested in a haircut before departing for Stratford!

There were occasional visits to Westfield (the new mammoth Mall) and frequent excursions to Paralympic events (what fantastic Opening and Closing Ceremonies!). Best seats (and food) were always provided. There was only one down-side. Security was tight and every return to the Village involved stringent car and passenger searches not to mention accreditation scrutiny. We had at our disposal a BMW and two delightful chauffeurs (one a retired Head Master of a Primary School and the other a novice monk). We visited all the Stratford and Greenwich venues and Eva was involved in a couple of medal ceremonies. The announcement that the Village Mayor was appearing met with more cheers than those that greeted politicians and other glitterati. Very gratifying.

And now, after a magical three weeks, we are back home in Aldeburgh, with our friends, our garden, our grandchildren, our great grandchild, our golf, our dog (a labradoodle) and our shopping at the Co-op. For both of us, it was a great privilege and an unforgettable experience to have been at the heart of the Paralympics. And for me there was one rather unexpected spin-off. I developed new-found sympathy and respect for the late Sir Dennis Thatcher, an OM and undoubtedly the role model for second stringers.

Memories of an Olympian

Keith Armistead (Scrutton '56) recalls his early memories of Lou Dapeng (known as Bobby Lou at School), the OM who chaired the bid for the Beijing Olympics:

"Bobby Lou, who featured in the summer issue of *Martlet*, was already an accomplished sportsman at Mill Hill. He quickly established a fine

reputation as a gymnast, runner and especially as a rugby player, following his arrival from Belmont in 1950. Bobby captained our Under Fifteen 1951 side from fly half and was a dominating influence in every game we played. His wide, sweeping runs unhinged opposing defences, creating opportunities for the rest of us. He used Chinese characters to sign our team photographs. His potential as a sportsman appeared limitless. I remember our frustration when we learned he had returned to Beijing quite soon in his Mill Hill career. His subsequent success comes as no surprise."

Paradise Rescued

David Stannard (Burton Bank '76) who has been for many years our Australian OM rep writes to us from Paradise Rescued in Bordeaux – or maybe from Melbourne:

"Someone has to do it!! As a family we have been lucky enough to own a small house in the village of Cardan near Bordeaux, France for the last 20 years as our one 'fixed home' as we travelled the world to work. Choosing a place in France was a compromise between reasonable proximity to an international airport, decent weather and vineyards.

However, we had never anticipated that the planning zones would change so dramatically, threatening to change our tiny community village into a small town and eliminate our rural vineyard views across a 12th century church. We either had to sell up or pay up! We decided that Paradise had

to be "Rescued"! And so a micro-winery business was born.

After making the first vineyard purchase in mid 2009, we started organic viticultural management of our first small half hectare block in January 2010. The process of converting a vineyard from a pesticide and herbicide zone to full organic terroir requires patience. 2010 turned out a good year for Bordeaux red wines and we produced our first 100% varietal Cabernet Franc wine called Cloud9. A full varietal CabFranc is pretty rare in Bordeaux where this grape variety is normally used as a blend wine. Steady improvements in fruit and wine quality can be seen with successive vintages.

The mission of Paradise Rescued is all about protecting the heritage and environment of our beautiful village and one of the greatest

pleasures has been the amazing support from our local community. Harvest days are a celebration for our sector of the village of Cardan. Currently all production of our hand crafted Cloud9 wine is exported to Australia but..."

The Middlesex scheme made a huge impact on the lives of a generation of Millhillians. At the instigation of Michael Henderson and with the enthusiasm of Gerry Westoby the Middlesex Scheme is to be immortalised through the memories of these boys.

The 21st Century has its own Middlesex Scheme, the A Better Chance Bursary fund. Fourteen young people have already benefitted from this and hopefully in the future they will wish to recount the impact which the opportunity provided by the scheme has had on their lives.

Many OMs are also Old Belmontians; they will have seen with interest the plans for a new building at Belmont which is due to start construction in the spring of 2013 (computer generated image shown). Mill Hill marked its Bicentenary in 2007 with the Favell Building; Belmont is to mark its Centenary with a building too. The Foundation Appeal has been tasked with raising £800,000 towards the £3.4m cost of this building. Over £250,000 of this total has already been pledged.



The Foundation Appeal office also remains committed to facilitating the on-going refurbishment of the Science Building at Mill Hill and to the long-term Bursary Endowment Fund. For any project to be successful, the fundraising must involve a good percentage of OMs. The Foundation Appeal is five years old and about one in twenty OMs has now made a donation. It is interesting that those who attend events and/or are OM Club members are the most likely to give; these are the people engaged with their old school. Over the next phase on fundraising it is crucial that we can substantially increase the percentage of OMs participating.

Obituaries

Sadly we have to report the death of John McAllister. Full obituaries appear on the website and in the School Magazine and there is only space for a brief mention of his achievement here.

John McAllister (Ridgeway 1957-62) died suddenly on 1st March 2012. Born in 1944 John grew up at Mill Hill, his father Percy being a key member of the teaching staff from 1925 to 1962 and then Hon Sec of the OM Club until his death in 1970. John himself was a popular member of the school and was successful both academically and in a wide range of sports. He read History at Corpus Christi

College, Cambridge where he enhanced his reputation both as rugby player and bon viveur. At Cambridge, he met Glen and they married in 1969. In the same year, he captained the OMs 1st XV and played for Middlesex.



He joined the History Department at Aldenham School in 1967 and served the school and its pupils with great distinction for the next 38 years, 13 of them as housemaster. His enthusiasm, commitment, friendship, fairness, openness and pastoral care, as well as his self-deprecation and humour, were inspirational to successive generations of pupils. After retirement, he continued working as an educational consultant.

First and foremost, John was a family man and immensely proud of his family. He is survived by Glen and their children, Tim and Emma, and their grandchildren.

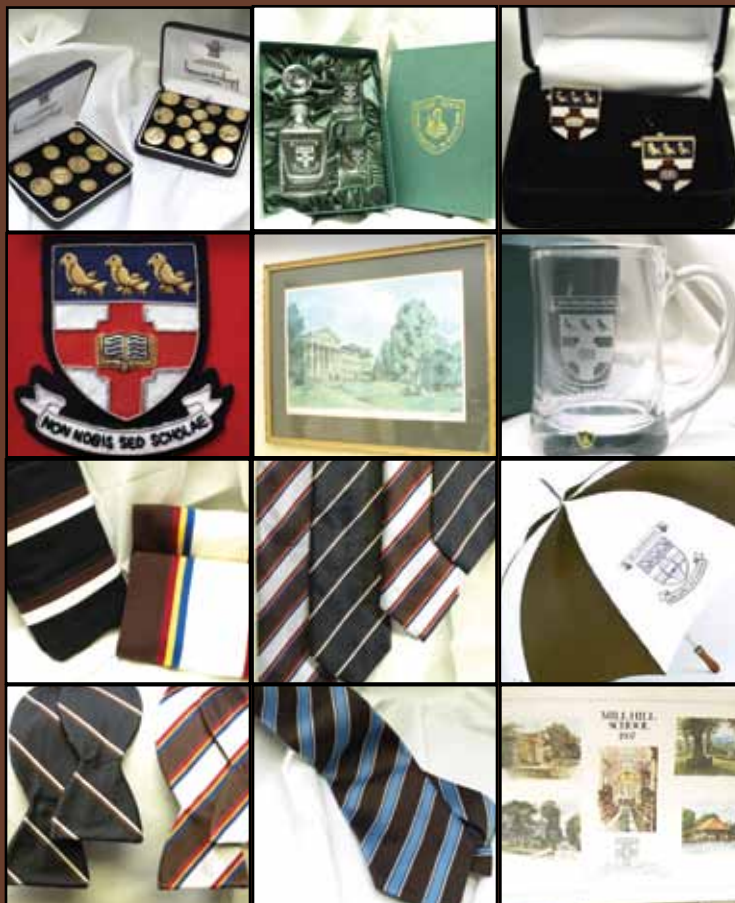
